SGDE Spring 2024 Colloquium ft. Dr. Mia Bennett: The spectral turn of satellites >Friday, January 19, from 3-5pm

Join SGDE in welcoming Dr. Mia Bennett from the University of Washington to kick off our Spring 2024 Colloquium lineup! This talk will take place from 3:30-5pm on Friday, January 19 in room S107 of the ENR2 building. All are welcome!

Dr. Mia Bennett is an assistant professor in the Department of Geography. As a political geographer with geospatial skills, she is interested in transportation infrastructure and natural resource development in northern frontiers, namely the Arctic, Russian Far East, and the more remote corridors of China's Belt and Road Initiative. Her work combines ethnographic fieldwork and remote sensing to consider issues such as how local and Indigenous actors leverage geopolitical transformations to attract development to their homelands. In recent years, Bennett's work has expanded to consider the geopolitics and epistemologies of satellites and remote sensing, leading her to collaborate with colleagues to develop the field of critical remote sensing.

Sociology Colloquium ft. Dr. Thomas Dietz: Decisions for Sustainability: Research Challenges

The first Sociology Colloquium of the semester will be Friday, January 19. Dr. Thomas Dietz will be speaking in Social Sciences Room 415, from 12:00pm -1:15pm. Decisions for Sustainability: Research Challenges Achieving sustainability requires decisions that take account of uncertain facts and diverse values. Research on individual and collective decision making is scattered across disciplines and traditions. But it can provide useful insights for moving in a just way towards increased well-being for humans and other species and reduced stress on the environment. Looking across work on decision making also suggests important research challenges. These include: 1-a greater engagement of science with normative theory, 2-addressing emergent issues. 3-better conceptual integration of structure and agency in a 21st century political economy 4-finding ways to articulate research insights with the needs of decision making, 5processes for linking science and deliberation, and a 6-continued focus on the drivers of environmental stress as well an expanded focus on what shapes well-being. The contributions sociology can make to the study of well-being in the context of sustainability is illustrated by an analysis of environmental and other influences on subjective well-being in a sample of ~97,000 individuals across
