Prashanti Sharma and Elise Arellano-Thompson

Kudos to Prashanti and Elise for their co-authorship in their first paper coming out of the Social Pixel lab: <u>A globally sampled high-resolution hand-labeled validation dataset for evaluating surface water extent maps</u>

"A globally sampled high-resolution hand-labeled validation dataset for evaluating surface water extent maps." published in Earth System Science Data two weeks ago. We produced a dataset of 100 diverse surface water samples around the world that others can use to benchmark their own water algorithms using high resolution Planetscope data. Rohit our former postdoc (now at PNNL) led the paper. We evaluated and compared commonly used global surface water datasets with our new high resolution benchmark data.
