Sanctions and Export Control Affecting Travel and Studies for Graduate and Professional Students

Directors of Graduate Studies, Graduate Program Coordinators, and Graduate Students:

You may be planning to travel or conduct international research soon. Please remember to register your official University international travel in the International Travel Registry. On this page you will find frequently asked questions and other resources. This Registry initiates the review and approval process, which is necessary for official travel. Research, attending conferences, and other activities connected to your graduate studies or funded by the University of Arizona are official travel. Give at least three weeks for the approval process- longer if sanctions or elevated-risk locations are involved. International Travel will begin their review of travel registrations no sooner than 30 days prior to the departure date; expect delays during peak travel seasons.

Prior to joining UA and USAID in 2010, Laura managed the Minimum Economic Recovery Standards initiative and led practitioner learning initiatives for microenterprise development and financial services at the SEEP Network. She holds a B.S. in foreign service from Georgetown University and an M.A. in international development from American University.

Colloquium ft. Sama Alshaibi

Join SGDE in welcoming Sama Alshaibi, Regents Professor of Photography, Video, and Imaging at the University of Arizona.

Sama Alshaibi's work explores the notion of aftermath—the fragmentation and dispossession that violates the individual and a community following the destruction of their social, natural, and built environment. In her photographs and videos, Alshaibi often uses her own body as both subject and medium, a staging site for encounters, peripheries, and refuge, even when carrying the markings of war and dislocation. Alshaibi's sculptural installations evoke the body's disappearance and act as counter-memorials to war and forced exile. Alshaibi's monograph, *Sand Rushes In*, was published by Aperture, NYC. It features her 8-year *Silsila* series, which probes the human dimensions of borders, migration, and ecological demise.

Need funding for your summer fieldwork in Latin America? Graduate students in any department can apply for funding through the **Tinker Field Research Grant!**

UArizona graduate students from ANY DISCIPLINE who wish to conduct research in Latin America during summer 2024 are encouraged to apply. Tinker Field Research Grants provide degree-seeking graduate students with funds for travel to Spanish- and Portuguese-speaking Latin American and Caribbean countries as well as limited field research expenses.

The Tinker Foundation supports travel and field-related expenses for master's and pre-dissertation fieldwork in Latin America during the summer (May through August). Applicants who plan to complete an M.A. thesis or Ph.D. dissertation will be given priority over students who plan to utilize an examination option to complete their degree.

The "Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences" research area has multiple positions that apply to SGDE majors, however, depending on your particular interests other research areas may be worth exploring. You can also search through all the research areas using more specific keywords, like GIS, conservation, environmental justice, urban studies, and more. The National Science Foundation funds Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REUs) for students to conduct research alongside faculty around the country during the summer. Though exact numbers vary between programs, there is typically a stipend included for ~10 weeks during the summer.

Michael Bonine Memorial Travel & Research Award

The Statewide California Earthquake Center (SCEC) is excited to announce that applications are now open for **Summer 2024 undergraduate Internships!** Since 1994, SCEC Internships have supported impactful research experiences of more than 700 undergraduate students who worked with SCEC scientists on a broad range of earthquake science projects, including paleoseismic field investigations, 3D fault mapping, ground motion simulations and other high-performance computing applications, hazard analysis, and educational products.

SCEC Internships are **fully funded**, including travel and lodging expenses. Undergraduate students interested in earthquake science have the opportunity to apply for two internship programs:

- The Summer Undergraduate Research Experience (SURE) internship pairs students one-on-one
 with scientists for specialized research at the scientist's institution or field site.
- The Supported Opportunities for Undergraduates and Researchers to Collaborate on Earthquakes
 (SOURCES) is a remotely-mentored research experience that allows participants the opportunity to
 gain experience regardless of geographic location or availability of local researchers.

Graduate students from disciplines that specifically address Indigenous resilience are invited to apply. Special consideration will be given to applications to support graduate students:

- whose work addresses the water, energy and food access and challenges, and/or climate change challenges faced by Native American and Indigenous communities, especially those within Arizona; and/or

Stefano Bloch

Kudos to Stefano Bloch for his article, "A Legal Geography of Prison and Other Carceral Spaces" in Antipode – published online January 30, 2024 - https://onlinelibrary.wiley.com/doi/10.1111/anti.13028 -> Abstract:

As scholars apply the concept of "the carceral" to more and increasingly diffuse spaces of containment, displacement, and cordoning across free society, I call for a means by which "carcerality" is measured and understood as a productive force in the denial of constitutional rights and protections. I therefore provide a legal reading of carcerality, which establishes prisons as the sine qua non of the carceral landscape, preceded by an analysis of how the reliance on civil law, nuisance ordinances, and other methods of constitutional circumvention in the absence of criminal procedure works within the public sphere to punish residents residing within what Foucault called the carceral archipelago. Along the way I provide vignettes about my own experience with the legal and insidious forms of criminalisation and non-criminal punishment that comprise the carceral continuum.

Congratulations to Beth Tellman for her recent NSF CAREER award! These are highly competitive and a big deal, as you all know...it is great news.

A brief summary:

To expand urban development, preserve property values, or avoid paying for flood insurance, real estate developers in the US may request to remove properties from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) regulatory floodplain, often by building flood mitigation infrastructure like levees and improved drainage. However, this flood mitigation infrastructure could be draining floodwaters to others downstream, an effect has not been measured. This Faculty Early Career Development CAREER project will advance knowledge by generating observed flood data to measure if and where flood mitigation infrastructure changes flooding and who is affected. The project will build capacity for environmental justice organizations to use satellite-based flood maps to challenge changes to FEMA flood maps and advocate for adaptation funding for their communities.

'Earth Observation to Address Inequities in Post-Flood Recovery'

Floods harm communities globally, with impacts intensifying due to increased development in flood-prone locations and climate change. Flooding affects communities unevenly, and the recovery process can create additional disparities in flood risk and resilience. While Earth Observation (EO) data are commonly used to map flood events, they are underutilized to monitor recovery. This is a missed opportunity for documenting inequitable recovery outcomes, which can impact flood-affected communities' physical safety, homes, and livelihoods and prevent preparation for and mitigation of future floods. We present a framework for EO scientists and community partners to use EO for flood recovery monitoring. The goal of the framework is to outline steps to monitor local recovery progress so that inequities can be identified and addressed.
