SBS Summer 2025 Dissertation Fellowship Competition

SBS will award summer fellowships of \$8,250 for doctoral students who have completed all degree requirements other than the dissertation (ABD). Based on available resources, we expect to award 8 fellowships. This merit-based competition enables awardees to devote full-time summer effort to work on their dissertations so as to expedite the completion of their PhDs.

The fellowship can support various stages of dissertation development, from data collection and analysis to final writeup. Successful applicants must articulate how fellowship support at a given stage will impact total time to degree. All applications must be submitted by 5pm, **Monday**, **February 24**. Grad CAFE Mentoring Community Program is recruiting for Spring 2025

The Graduate College Office of Diversity and Inclusion is looking for participants for the spring semester cohort of Graduate Communities for Academic Fellowship & Efficacy (Grad CAFE). We are looking for 1st and 2nd year doctoral students who identify as underrepresented in some way (racial/ethnic minority, gender minority, women in STEM, queer gender nonconforming, disabled, first-generation/low income). They participate for one semester in a weekly one-hour student success seminar on Tues, Wed, or Thurs from at lunchtime. That seminar, which is co-facilitated by Community Leaders (doctoral students who have successfully passed their comprehensive exams) provides professional development on skills necessary for success in graduate school. It also provides an interdisciplinary, intersectional community of doctoral students who support each other. There are also smaller peer mentoring community meetings (during the class period) for small group networking and problem solving. Additionally, all the sections come together once a month for a Cafecito dinner (Thursday night from 5:30-7:30) which provides networking and professional development. Students can apply HERE.
