Through the Fire: Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona's 10th Annual Camp Fury

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Background

Camp Fury

- Founded in 2009 by Tucson Fire Chief, Laura Baker, and Tubac Fire District Chief and GSSOAZ Board Chair, Cheryl Horvath.
- Camp Fury is a high-adventure camp offering immersion experiences into public safety fields, including how to operate a firehose, dust for fingerprints, rappel down a building, and climb a firetruck ladder.
- Partners with 25 different public safety agencies in Southern Arizona.

Current Research

- Women currently represent only **3.5%** of firefighters, * 13.6% of police officers and 30.6% of emergency medical technicians and paramedics.¹
- In 2000, only **17%** of those working full-time in one of 184 * occupations requiring strength, stamina, dexterity or involving outdoor, dirty or dangerous work were women.²
- In 2000, 46.6% of women were either an EMT, medical ** technician, nurse or had another medical occupation prior to their first paid fire job, compared to only **34.4%** of men.²
- 84.7% of women have experienced different treatment due ** to their gender, compared to only **12.4%** of men.²
- 36.5% of women reported that their gender has created * barriers to their career advancement, compared to 7.4% of men.²

Methods

Participants & Procedures

- ✤ 26 Girl Scouts completed pre-surveys prior to the beginning of Camp Fury.
- ✤ 28 Girl Scouts completed post-surveys following the completion of Camp Fury.
- ✤ Girls ranged in age from 14 to 18 and in academic year from entering 9th grade to entering their first year of college.
- ✤ Took place during the summer of 2018, beginning on Tuesday, May 29 and concluding on Saturday, June 2





Perceived Leadership Ability: Before vs. After





Challenge Seeking Score: Before vs. After Camp




Understanding of How to **Pursue Careers: Before** vs. After Camp
